

Redbank Street: Street Trees

There are two main elements to the tree plantings proposed: an avenue of honour along Perry Road, and street tree plantings along Navarre Street, including feature trees at the public hall.

It is recommended that a single species be selected for the avenue of honour, and that a variety of trees are planted along Navarre Street.

The trees suggested below are being put forward as guide to find out what types of trees the community would like to see planted in Redbank. Trees listed as potential avenue trees may also be suitable for planting in Navarre Street.

The selection will be shortlisted/finalized once public feedback has been received. Aspects of the overall plan such available budget, footpaths, parking, and street furniture will also affect the final selection.



Avenue Trees – Perry Road

Number of trees – 9

Suggested species:

Flowering Gum - Corymbia ficifolia wildfire (these have recently been planted in the Tanwood Avenue of Honour)

This is a tough and compact Australian native which puts on a brilliant display of fiery red flowers throughout the summer months, attracting birds. Evergreen. Size - 6 x 3-4m.





Scarlet Oak – Quercus coccinea

Wide spreading, rounded form with large foliage showcasing a brilliant display of colour in autumn when the leaves turn an intensely vivid scarlet colour. Glossy green in spring. Young bark is relatively smooth and grey, darkening with maturity. Deciduous. Size $-12 \times 8m$.





Kurrajong - Brachychiton populneus x acerifolius 'Jerilderie Red'

Densely canopied tree with bloated trunk and large lobed leaves. Packed with stunning powdery-red, bell-shaped flowers during summer. Evergreen. Size – 8x7m.





Jacaranda - Jacaranda mimosifolia

Green foliage which turns yellow in winter before shedding. Purple, bell-shaped flowers are produced in Summer, covering the canopy. Deciduous. Size - 10 x 8m. (Note: it may be challenging to grow this tree in Redbank climate, but including to gauge interest.)





Navarre Street and Hall precinct

Number of trees -12 + 5

Suggested species:

Silky Oak Grevillea robusta

Tall fast-growing ornamental native grevillea tree, impressive and unmistakable in full flower in spring, when it seems to glow. Evergreen. Up to 20m.





Pyrus calleryana – Capital pear

Narrow tree with luscious shiny green leaves that hang vertically from branches. Suitable for tight spaces. Deciduous. Size $-11 \times 1-3m$.





Dwarf Brittle Gum - Eucalyptus mannifera 'Little Spotty'

Ornamental with strongly spotted bark and wide spreading canopy, with narrow green leaves and white flowers in the summer. Evergreen. Size 5-7m x 5m.





Cercis canadensis - Eastern Redbud


Small tree with twisted trunk and spreading branches and broad green leaves which turn yellow in autumn. Blossom like flowers appear from late winter to early spring, starting off as deep red coloured buds and opening to pink, with long seedpods developing and lasting until winter. Deciduous. Size $-8 \times 6m$.





White Bottle brush - Callistemon salignus

Dense, willow-like small tree green foliage and cream/white bottle brush flowers. Evergreen. Size $-7-9m \times 4m$.





Crepe Myrtle - Lagerstroemia indica

Hardy small tree with shiny dark green foliage turning orange/red and maroon. Violet purple flowers from summer through to autumn and mottled trunk.
